



World Record Costume Requirements

For this year's World Book Day on Thursday 3rd March Long Crendon School will be attempting to break the World Record for the largest gathering of people dressed as dogs. The idea for this came from Year 5 pupil Emma Morris, who has always wanted to be a World Record Holder, and after some extensive research came across this record, and took her idea to School.

As the big day is approaching fast, we thought it would be a good idea to give some tips on creating your Canine costume.

In order to become a record holding school, the rules state;

“All participants must be dressed in a full dog costume, head to toe, including headpiece with ears”

We suggest wearing black/brown/grey trousers and top, stapling a circle of card to fit your head and sticking to that some doggy shaped ears of your choice. A tail could be made from a leg of an old pair of tights.

Alternatively, white disposable overalls (with hood) are available from Amazon or Ebay which can then be customised by sticking on spots etc.

We have a number of **adult** sized white overalls that are available from the school office to enable **parents/grandparents** etc to join in the School's world record attempt.

We need as many adults as possible to join in on the day if we are to reach the magic number of 265, so please join us. We only have to stay together for 5 minutes to achieve the record.

On the morning of Wednesday 2nd March there will be an ear making workshop in the School Art Room from 8.45am -12.30pm. Adults that would like help with their own costumes are welcome to join us. Children that need

help making ears etc will be collected from their classes during the morning, and will bring their canine creations home ready to wear back to school the next day.

There will be a prize for the best dog costume in each class, from Pre School and for younger siblings, plus best adult. These prizes have been kindly sponsored by Thame Service Station.
